If I Were Peter Monologue

It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrong. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.”

The second letter is the book called second (written 2) Corinthians. In the passage at 2 Corinthians 1:8-10, Paul wrote, “Sisters, about the troubles we experienced in Asia, We were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired of life itself. We felt we had received the sentence of death. But this happened that we might not rely on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead. He has delivered us from such a deadly peril, and he will deliver us again. On him we have set our hope that he will continue to deliver us.”

If I Were the Church in Galatia Monologue

If I were the Church in Galatia, I would have received one of Paul's letters. The people of Galatia were called Galatians. In Galatians 5:14, Paul tells us, "Love your neighbor as yourself." In Galatians 5:22, Paul writes, "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."

If I Were Tychicus Monologue

If I were Tychicus, I would be sent by Paul to the Christians in Ephesus to tell the Ephesians about Paul's ministry. The letter that Paul writes includes a passage that says, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord for it is right. 'Honor your mother and father' – which is the first commandment with a promise – 'so that it may go well with you that you may enjoy long life on earth.'" (Ephesians 6:1-3)

If I Were Sad Monologue

If I were sad, I'd read the very short book of Philippians (fill ip pea ans). Paul wrote a letter to the Christians of Philippi (Fill a pie). This letter is filled with joyful thoughts and good will. In Philippians 4:4-7, Paul writes, "Rejoice in the Lord, always. Again, I say rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your mind in Christ Jesus."

If I Were Onesimus Monologue

(O knee See mus)

If I were Onesimus, I would be a Christian of Colosse (Ka lo see). I would have visited with Paul and then traveled with Tychius back to Colosse to tell of the news of Paul. In the letter Paul wrote to those of us in Colosse, or Colossians 3:20, Paul reminds us, “Children, obey your parents in everything for this pleases the Lord.”

If I Were a Thessalonian Monologue

If I were a Thessalonian, Paul would have given me instructions in 1 Thessalonians

5:13-18. Paul gives the people of the early church the following instructions:

- Live in peace with one another
- Encourage the disheartened
- Help the weak
- Be patient with everyone
- Rejoice always
- Pray continually
- Give thanks in all circumstances
-and more

If I Were Timothy Monologue

If I were Timothy, I would travel with Paul. Sometimes, I would be sent on behalf of Paul to places to take messages and preach. I would receive letters that Paul had written to me. These letters are recorded as books of the Bible.

In 1 (first) Timothy 1:15, Paul writes, “Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason, I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who believe in him and receive eternal life.”

If I Were Titus Monologue

If I were Titus, I would be a close friend and helper to Paul. Paul wrote a letter to me and it is recorded as the book of Titus. In this book, Paul tells me to remind Christians to work for good. In Titus 3:1&2, the Bible tells us the following:

- Follow the laws and leaders of the land
- Slander no one
- Be peaceful, considerate and gentle

If I Were Philemon Monologue

If I were struggling or wanting to give up, I would read Hebrews 10:19-24, “Therefore, brothers and sisters, since we have confidence to enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus....let us draw near to God with a sincere heart and with the full assurance that faith brings, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience and having our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds.”

If I Were James Monologue

If I were James, I would be the brother of Jesus. I wrote a letter to Christians everywhere. At the end of my letter (James 5:13-16), I asked, "Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective."

If I Were Mindful Of Praise Monologue

If I were mindful of praise, I would read 1 Peter 1:3-9. It says, “Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, who through faith are shielded by God’s power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the end result of your faith, the salvation of your soul.”

If I Were Feeling Unloved Monologue

If I were feeling unloved, I would read 1 John 4:7-16. It says, "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

This is how we know that we live in him and he in us: He has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in them and they in God. And so we know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them."

If I Were Jude Monologue

If I were Jude, I would be the brother of Jesus and James. I also wrote a letter to all Christians. I end the letter, “To him who is able to keep you from stumbling and to present you before his glorious presence without fault and with great joy— to the only God our Savior be glory, majesty, power and authority, through Jesus Christ our Lord, before all ages, now and forevermore! Amen”

If I Were the Book of Revelation Monologue
